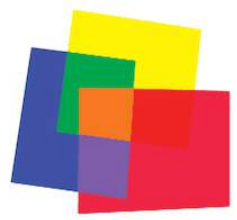

ART IN CONTEXT



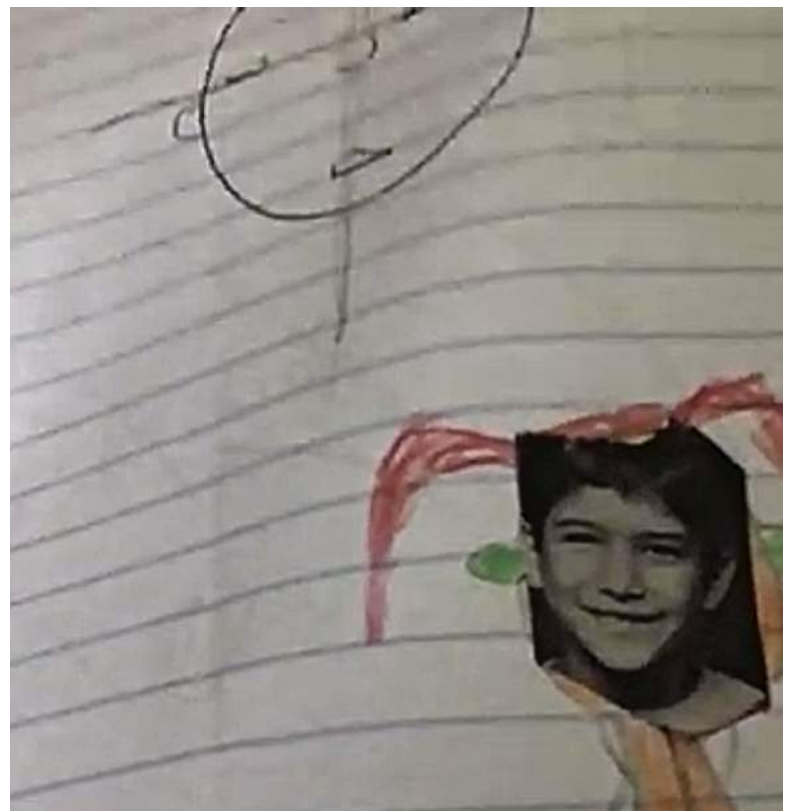
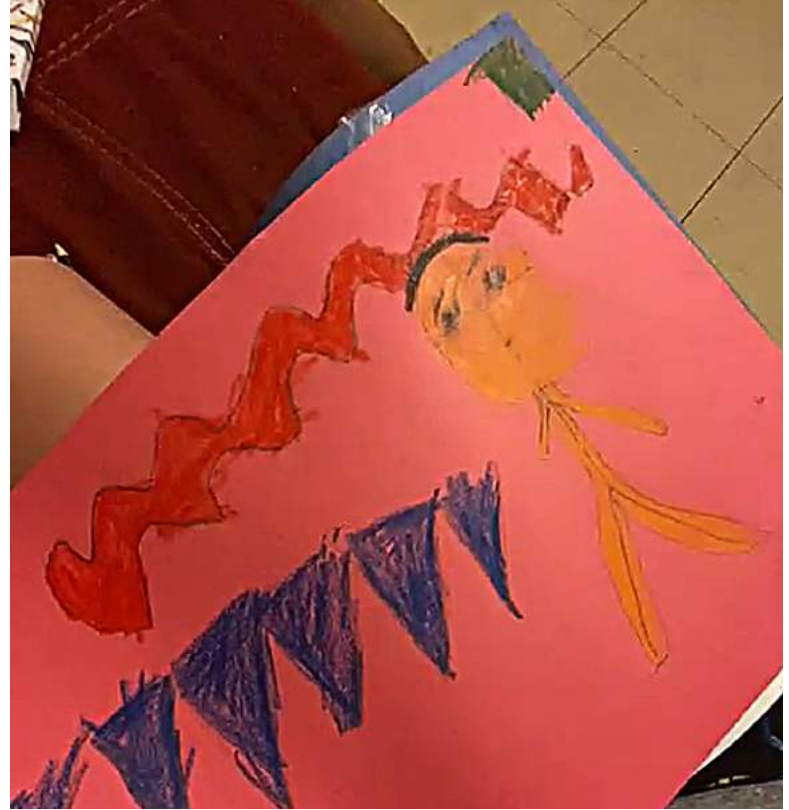

Whether they used their scissors or pencils to draw, students were able to create entirely unique portraits inspired by the art of **Pablo Picasso**.

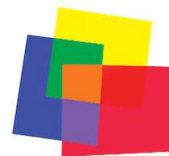


Ordinary Materials, Extraordinary Results



Because the supplies students had access to were limited, we carefully planned curricula for DAT's distance learning program to utilize materials frequently found at home, along with found and recycled objects students might incorporate. Through these projects, students discovered how Q-tips could become paint brushes, and learned how to create their own paints from food coloring, and **homemade** clay by combining basic kitchen ingredients.
